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Board Notes

Highlights from the January 8 2014 Board Meeting

As part of the OSMA Board's commitment to governance, 30 minutes of each face-to-face board meeting is dedicated to governance training. During this session the board reviewed two policies including the Per Diems and Honorariums policy. The Audit Committee has been asked to investigate the mileage rates and director per diems and the Governance Committee has been asked to review the Per Diem and Honorarium policy.



Kristen Kelderman from Farm and Food Care met with the Board to discuss Code of Conduct for on-farm employees. This code is a great way to start a conversation with employees on animal care and is a proactive means of demonstrating their commitment to animal care. Producers who are interested in implementing a Code of Conduct can contact the OSMA office for a sample one.

OSMA will be meeting with the Assistant Deputy Minister in January to discuss industry priorities and programs that will help the industry reach its goal of increasing the ewe flock by 20% by 2020. The Board is firm that RMP is a top priority and that a strong RMP is the basis of expansion and moving the industry forward. This message will be conveyed at the meeting. Other items that were discussed were continued work on the Cost of Production, ewe finance and access to medications.

The OSPCA is working on signing commodity specific Memorandums of Understanding (MOU). These MOUs are a great way to build communication and trust between the sheep industry and the OSPCA. This would enable joint OSPCA and OSMA training and provide the OSPCA with a contact person who can assist with farm calls.

There is growing public concern about the use of medications in livestock agriculture and its contribution to antimicrobial resistance. In response to this growing concern, OSMA is working on a position statement related to Antimicrobial use in the industry.

The Governance Committee drafted an insurance policy for OSMA Board and District Events, which was accepted at this meeting. This new policy will be distributed to each district.

OSMA has begun work with Farm Products to organize an Industry Advisory Committee meeting. This meeting is a requirement in our regulations and representatives from the processing and retail sectors will be invited along with producers.

The Board has instructed staff to prepare for a Strategic Plan review at the April meeting. The next Board meeting is a WebEx on February 19

District Resolutions from 2013 AGM

Liability Insurance Coverage from District 1

The Southwestern Ontario Sheep Farmers (SOSF) held their 33rd annual lamb BBQ with over 450 in attendance.

The SOSF were under the impression that they were covered for liability insurance under OSMA policy guidelines however the SOSF found out that this year's event was not covered as in the past.

Motion

I move that we ask the General Manager and the Board of Directors to approach their insurance provider to include all sheep and lamb events that promote the industry to be included for liability insurance coverage through the OSMA insurance policy.

Response

OSMA's insurance broker has met with the Board around including all sheep and lamb events that promote the industry in our insurance policy.

During this discussion it was mentioned that Party Alcohol Liability Insurance (PAL) is available and details on this insurance were circulated to the Board members to take back to their districts.

As a result of the discussions with the insurance broker, it was determined that any non-OSMA events will not be covered under OSMA's insurance policy and that clubs should pursue private insurance through PAL.

Additionally OSMA's Governance Committee is drafting a policy in relation to insurance for District events that includes getting certificates of insurance for events.

Webinar Use for Education Day from District 2

Response

Staff has been tasked with investigating the use and cost of webinars for the education day of the AGM.

Outdoor Farm Show from District 3

OSMA has a role to promote lamb and educate producers.

Canada's Outdoor Farm Show in Woodstock attracted thousands of farmers and their families every year for the past 20 years for three days in September.

2013 had over 750 agricultural exhibitors and 42,900 attendees.

The market class lamb competition held at this farm show in 2011-12 was a huge attraction to visitors and an education to them on lamb production.

An opportunity to buy a lunch with lamb at this big farm show will allow families to think of lamb as a meat choice.

Be it resolved

OSMA makes arrangements to have lamb served at Canada's Outdoor Farm Show and also brings back the market class competition for lambs to the show or something similar to showcase our product.

Response

OSMA will be working with the Outdoor Farm Show to investigate a lamb carcass competition along with having lamb served at the 2014 show. A meeting with the Show has been arranged for early January to start the planning.

District 5 Resolution

Whereas with the high cost of feed grain and commodities, farmers are looking for alternative energy source to finish lambs.

Therefore let it be resolved that the district would like to see Ridgetown College do a nutrition trial with 100% cob meal using the appropriate protein and mineral sources.

Response

OSMA been in contact with Ridgetown College about this request and have provided Dr. P. Luimes with a letter of support for an alternative feed project, which, if funded, would include research on cob meal.

Combined RMP Resolution

Districts 2, 5 and 7 each brought forward a resolution to the Ontario Sheep Marketing Agency's (OSMA) Annual General Meeting (AGM) in October requesting that OSMA ensure that the Risk Management Program (RMP) is a priority lobbying activity.

Response

As per OSMA's 2013 Strategic Plan, the OSMA Board will continue to make RMP a priority.

District 11 Resolution

Whereas OSMA district 11 includes farming regions in northwestern Ontario, namely Thunder Bay, Rainey River and Dryden,
and

Whereas there are sheep producers with an interest in OSMA activities in those areas
and

Whereas these areas are over 1500 km from southern Ontario:

Therefore be it resolved that the OSMA board consider special funding to assist with travel costs for delegate(s) attending the OSMA Annual Meeting from the geographic districts of Thunder Bay, Rainey River and Dryden

Response

The resolution was defeated at the AGM however, the OSMA Board had a subsequent discussion about it at the November 2013 board meeting.

While the Board will not be considering special funding for delegates, the Finance and Audit Committee will be reviewing mileage rates for delegates to the AGM.

Biosecurity–Important Now More Than Ever

In light of the recent cases of Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea (PED) in Ontario, OSMA is reminding sheep producers of the importance of biosecurity. Four cases of PED have been confirmed in the province, and since it is such a highly contagious virus, more cases are expected to be confirmed. PED is easily spread through the movement of animals, people, vehicles, and equipment.

Although sheep cannot contract PED, the spread of this disease and its potential impact underscores the importance of biosecurity to all livestock producers. Biosecurity is not only important in preventing the spread of foreign animal diseases (FADs); its implementation can help prevent the spread of other diseases that commonly occur at some level on farms in Canada. Preventing disease spread and occurrence will promote the health and in turn, the productivity and profitability of your individual flock. However, just as importantly, as individual producers take steps to implement biosecurity practices; it will help improve the collective health of all sheep flocks in Ontario.

A biosecurity plan does not need to be high-tech, complicated or expensive to be effective. Farm-level biosecurity is basically a series of management practices designed to minimize, prevent or control the following:

- The introduction of infectious diseases onto a farm
- Spread of disease within your flock
- Export of these diseases beyond the farm, which may have an adverse effect on the economy, the environment, and human health.

On a sheep farm, a biosecurity plan focuses on:

- 1) Exclusion: reduce the introduction of disease pathogens on sheep farms
- 2) Management: reduce the spread of disease pathogens within a sheep farm
- 3) Containment: reduce the spread of disease pathogens between sheep farms or from sheep farms to other animal populations.

Specific measures you can take to promote biosecurity include controlling the movement of people, vehicles, and animals onto your farm. Managing animal health by Isolating sick sheep, returning sheep, and flock additions will also help prevent disease spread and promote your flock's health. Record keeping is a valuable tool that can help you keep track of health events on your farm, as well as people and animal movement. Educating your family and others who work on your farm operation will help ensure that biosecurity measures are being applied consistently. Developing a response plan in advance of an animal health emergency can assist you with guiding farm activity if a disease outbreak occurs.

There are many small steps you can take to improve your farm's biosecurity. Recently, the Canadian Sheep Federation, in collaboration with industry stakeholders, developed the voluntary National Sheep On-Farm Biosecurity Standard, a Producer Planning Guide, and a laminated biosecurity poster for use by sheep producers. These are practical educational tools designed to assist you with the planning and implementation of biosecurity measures that are site-specific to your farm operation. Preventive Maintenance for Farm Structures

Our province has recently experienced extreme weather conditions – rain on top of existing snow, drifting snow and unbalanced snow loads on roofs can add to the stress already facing farm buildings in winter.

Here are some tips to help prevent damage in winter weather conditions.

Important: Take all necessary safety precautions when working from ladders and at heights.

1. Look for areas on your roofs and structures that have substantial snow build up.
 - o Consider hiring qualified people to remove the snow. Otherwise, with at least one other person, gradually remove piles of snow from your roof's pitches.
 - o Do not remove all of the snow from one pitch before moving to another, as this creates an unbalanced loading condition.
2. Look for damaged or weak areas of your buildings and structures, particularly in the roof trusses and the truss plates.
 - o Clean and reinforce or protect all truss plates that are rusty.
 - o Have an engineer complete a building assessment if you find an area of your building that has significant deterioration.
3. Assess your building's wind bracing components and repair those that are damaged or weakened.
4. Make sure downspouts and other drainage components are able to direct water away from the structure.

Farm buildings and structures should be able to withstand weather conditions. You can prevent damage to your buildings by making sure your buildings are strong and stable. Farmers are encouraged to always use best management practices when working around livestock and farm buildings.

Follow-Up Note to Business Risk Management Article

We wanted to follow up on the article we wrote in the December 2013 Sheep News on how Business Risk Management (BRM) programs might work together to provide support to a Sheep Producer during a year where income dropped by 50 per cent.

It should be noted that the example did not include the effect of the \$100 million dollar funding cap on the Risk Management Program which started in the 2013 program year.

The funding cap means that payments, depending on market conditions, may be pro-rated (less than the amount calculated) to ensure every participant is treated equally regardless of when they market their lambs. For the 2013 program, the final pro-ration will be determined at the time of the final program payment, in March 2014.

Species at Risk Farm Incentive Program

The Species at Risk Farm Incentive Program (SARFIP) offers substantial cost-share funding towards the establishment of selected Best Management Practices (BMP). The range of possible activities applies to croplands, grasslands, riparian areas, wetlands, or even woodlands. SARFIP for 2013-2014 introduces a new cost-share design to focus efforts on activities that directly support wildlife species at risk (SAR) that are known to reside on farm properties. SARFIP is available to farm businesses across the province, and is linked to the Canada-Ontario Environmental Farm Plan (EFP).

Ontario Hay Now Eligible for Financing Under Advance Payments Program

Agricultural Credit Corporation (ACC) has received approval to add hay to their growing list of eligible commodities within Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada's Advance Payments Program. Commencing with the 2014 program year, five categories of hay have been approved with an advance rate of \$57.50 per tonne. These five categories include: Alfalfa, Timothy, Mixed Hay-Alfalfa and Timothy, Orchardgrass Hay, and Mixed Hay (any mixture of grasses and/or legumes). The program will cover all Ontario hay and hay mixtures intended for export and domestic sales, including farm-to-farm sales but not including hay fed on the producer's own farm.

To be eligible for an advance, producers must have an established crop and be enrolled in either Agristability or the Forage Rainfall Production Insurance Program provided by Agricorp at: <http://bit.ly/1ahsBXx>. Neither Production Insurance nor Agristability are required if applying for an advance on bales stored after harvest in summer of 2014.
